Tutoring:

There are tutoring options available within our region. These include (but not exclusively) providers such as:

- Kip McGrath Free assessment/ Lessons \$65 per session
- NumberWorks'nWords -Free evaluation/ Lessons \$60 per hr
- SPELD NZ -Yearly membership cost \$50/ Lessons range \$30-\$90 per hr

Dyslexia is a term used to describe a range of persistent difficulties with reading and writing, and often including spelling, numeracy or musical notation (Ministry of Education, 2021).

Where to next...

Sometimes having a name for the learning difficulties they have experienced is empowering for the person and their whānau.

It is important to keep in mind:

- Teachers can make accommodations in the classroom without a diagnosis.
- Supports for classroom work can be implemented at the Primary and Intermediate levels using dyslexiafriendly strategies.
- Regarding secondary school assessments and NCEA, most schools will accept 'school-based evidence' for special assessment conditions such as reader/writer/computer use in senior exams. This means you may not need a formal assessment to access support. It is best to check with your intended high school what their policies are, as each school varies.
- Tertiary providers such as polytech and universities can provide students support with a formal assessment. If there is no formal assessment, these supports are still available but may take up to six months for targeted supports to be put in place.

If you decide to get a formal assessment, you can go through the public system or use a private provider.

Option 1: Public System

Hospital Referral - **no cost**

This is when the child is referred to the hospital by a doctor. They are referred to the hospital's clinical psychologist for a "C Grade" assessment. Your school can help you by providing a supporting letter. There can be a wait through the public system.

Option 2: Private

There are many private avenues available across our Southern Region These can vary in cost and waitlist availability.
